Baptism of Our Lord

First Reading: Genesis 1:1-5


Out of chaos, God brings order. Out of the formless void, God brings light. This familiar story was good news for the Israelites, who experienced much chaos in their history. It remains good news for us. God created and continues to create new life.

¹In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, ²the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. ³Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. ⁴And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. 5God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

Second Reading: Acts 19:1-7

In Ephesus, Paul encounters people who had received John's baptism of repentance but had never heard of the Holy Spirit or of baptism in the name of Jesus. After Paul baptizes them, the Holy Spirit comes upon them and empowers them with gifts of the Spirit.

¹While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. ²He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." ³Then he said, "Into what then

were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." ⁴Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." ⁵On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. ⁶When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied— ⁷altogether there were about twelve of them.

Gospel: Mark 1:4-11

Mark's gospel reports the story of Jesus' baptism with some irony: the one on whom the Spirit descends is himself the one who will baptize others with the Holy Spirit.

⁴John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

⁹In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. ¹¹And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

Has Anybody Here Made New Year's Resolutions?

Forbes Health once surveyed 1,000 adults which showed that some resolutions tended to be more popular than others. The first one has to do with improving fitness, with around 48% of people having the resolution to improve their fitness into the new year.

Other resolutions from the survey include:

- 38% said they would like to improve their finances.
- 36% said they want to improve their mental health.
- 34% said they would like to lose weight.
- 32% said they would like to improve their diet.

Other resolutions included things such as making more time for loved ones, quitting smoking, making more time for hobbies, improving work-life balance, and meditating regularly.

These are all well intentioned.

It is certainly good to set healthy goals for a new year.

One of mine is to journal as I read scripture. Unfortunately, we are not often successful in achieving these goals.

A 2007 study from the University of Bristol involving 3000 people showed that 88% of those who set New Year's resolutions fail. So if you do fail don't feel bad.

We're in good company.

Why do so many resolutions fail? One theory is that many of us fall into the trap of the allor-nothing mindset. One slip – a missed workout, splurge on a sale, or cake – can feel like a total failure, prompting the abandonment of the entire resolution. We just give up. Here are six other possible reasons:

- •We didn't define the resolution well.
- •We didn't have a plan.
- •We did not set ourselves up for success.

•We didn't define long and short-term rewards for ourselves.

•We tried to do it alone.

We knew deep down we wouldn't do it. Whatever the case we can forget that it is ok that none of us are ever going to be perfect. We do not need to beat ourselves up. That all of us are works in progress.

What if we instead of making resolutions we can't keep simply try this:

THIS YEAR I WANT TO BE MORE LIKE JESUS:
- Hang out with sinners. - Upset religious people. - Tell stories that make people think. - Choose unpopular friends.
- Be Kind, loving and Merciful. - Take naps on boats.

Be more like Jesus. While that is a pretty tall order, the good news is that Jesus understands us. When he went to the Jordan to be baptized by John he was identifying with us. His baptism was an act of solidarity with all of us. He did not need to

be baptized. Baptism is for sinners.

John was baptizing people who came to repent of their sins and turn their lives around. People who were making resolutions to make changes in their lives.

John makes it clear that this baptism of repentance he was giving them did not compare with the one he was preparing them for. The one who was following him would baptize with the Holy Spirit.

They were receiving a washing, a cleansing, but Jesus would give them a relationship with God through the Holy Spirit.

Their own efforts paled in comparison to what God was doing for them in Christ.

God saves when all of our efforts fall short. Jesus came not only to show us how to live but to give his life so that we do not have to earn salvation, reconciliation with God.

Jesus became human so that we may know personally the God who loves us unconditionally.

None of us can attain perfection.

We are always going to be works in progress because the Holy Spirit is always making things new. So the question is "what is God up to through the Spirit?" It is not a matter of what we can accomplish, what resolutions we can keep, but rather how can we join in what God is doing? It is not all up to us.



We can live each day asking God to use us, asking him to help us trust in him. Take even a few minutes a day to stop and focus on God.

Remember it is not about us but about the God who makes all things new.

Jesus came, he died and rose again to be with us now and forever!
