Fourth Sunday of Easter

First Reading: Acts 4:5-12

Peter and John had been arrested the previous day because they were proclaiming the news of the resurrection to the people. In today's reading, Peter is filled with the Holy Spirit so that he can proclaim salvation in Jesus' name to the religious authorities.

⁵The next day [the] rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, ⁶ with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. ⁷When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, "By what power or by what name did you do this?" 8Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, "Rulers of the people and elders, ⁹if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, ¹⁰let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God

Psalm 23

¹The Lord is my shepherd;

Second Reading: 1 John 3:16-24

Jesus' death on our behalf is the clearest demonstration of divine love. This is the very love we share with others, not just through our words but especially through our deeds. In sharing such love we fulfill God's commandments.

¹⁶We know love by this, that [Jesus Christ] laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay

down our lives for one another. 17 How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?

¹⁸Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. 19 And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will



reassure our hearts before him 20 whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. ²¹Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us,

we have boldness before God; ²² and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we given among mortals obey his commandments and do what pleases


²³And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has

commanded us. ²⁴All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

Gospel: John 10:11-18


In language that recalls the twenty-third psalm, Jesus describes himself as the shepherd who cares for his sheep. He is willing to die for them, and he is able to overcome death for them.

[Jesus said:] ¹¹"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. ¹²The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. ¹³The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. ¹⁴I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, ¹⁵just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. ¹⁶I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. ¹⁷For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. ¹⁸No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

Good Shepherd

Did you hear about the guy who prayed, 'Lord, so far today I've done all right. I haven't gossiped or lost my temper, and I haven't been nasty or greedy or grumpy. But in a few minutes I am going to have to get out of bed, and then I am going to need all the help I can get!"

What goes through your minds when you first get out of bed?

It may depend on the day.

Some days you may have something happening you are really looking forward to and other days you dread.

For me my mind is often racing about what I have to get done that day, especially on Sunday mornings.

My first prayer before I get up is "Lord I need your help today!"

That calms me down.

Then I read Scripture before anything else.

This helps me focus my mind on God before I read the news about all the problems with the world.

When I would start the day reading all of the bad news it would just make me anxious.

Prayer and reading Scripture sets a positive tone for the day.

We have just heard some very encouraging words from the Gospel of John.

Good words to remember when we get up in the morning or any time of day.

Jesus says "I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep."

This is one of several "I am" sayings of John.

Jesus is saying that he is in charge.

This is a divine claim.

To the Jewish People God was the Shepherd.



Psalm 23 is an example of this.

care of his sheep, and protects them to the point of giving his life for them.

In John's gospel Jesus is always in condeath.

He says, "I lay

down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again."

Jesus is never the helpless victim.

He gives his life willingly; no one takes it from him.

What does it mean to be a sheep of Jesus' flock? It means that we enter through his gate. Jesus is the way to salvation. Jesus is the way to peace. We know his voice and follow him. He cares for us, keeping us safe. And when we wander away, which we know we do all too often, he comes searching for us.

Jesus as the Good Shepherd has a relationship with us.

Jesus as the Good Shepherd makes clear that he is not a hired hand who will abandon us at the first sign of trouble.

He says:

"the hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me."

Have you ever been let down by someone when you really needed help?

I have had that experience.

A supervisor once told me when I was in a difficult

situation, "I'm glad it's you and not me." Thanks a lot. (sarcasm).

When we need help Jesus does not say to us "You're on your own. You made your bed so lie in it."

Jesus tells us to turn to him.

He will not let us down.

He is the shep- Jesus proved that we can trust him because he laid herd who takes down his life for us.

He keeps his word.

Each and every day we can wake up submitting ourselves to the Good Shepherd.

We can trust him.

We can pray for him to use us as he wills.

I would like to share with you a prayer that I learned years ago on my sabbatical that I use occasionally:
