First Sunday of Advent

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

¹The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

² In days to come the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it.

Many peoples shall come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may teach us his ways

and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem.

⁴He shall judge between the nations and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war any more.

⁵O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the LORD!

Psalm 122

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD."

² Now our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem.

³ Jerusalem is built as a city that is at unity with itself;

- ⁴ to which the tribes go up, the tribes of the LORD, the assembly of Israel, to praise the name of the LORD.
- ⁵For there are the thrones of judgment, the thrones of the house of David.
- ⁶ Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: "May they prosper who love you.

⁷ Peace be within your walls

and quietness within your towers.

⁸ For the sake of my kindred and companions, I pray for your prosperity.

⁹Because of the house of the LORD our God, I will seek to do you good."

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

Paul compares the advent of Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's comina in the future.

¹¹ Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is already the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹² the night is far gone; the day is near. Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; 13 let us walk decently as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in illicit sex and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.

[Jesus said to the disciples,] 36 "About that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³⁷ For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸ For as in the days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, 39 and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so, too, will be the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰ Then two will be in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left. 41 Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken, and one will be left. 42

Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. ⁴³But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁴ Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect."





Are we there yet?

Have you ever heard this question on a family road trip?

I know I asked my Dad this question as he was driving many times.

Or else the question was "NOW how many more miles. Dad?"

I as well as my siblings probably drive our parents nuts at times on our family trips, usually camping on the Summer.

My kids have never been too bad about this.

They were pretty patient.

They would kid me about when i would take a wrong turn and would get to our destination later, calling it "Dad's scenic routes." This happened in the Black Hills on our way back to the campsite from Mount Rushmore.

We went to the light show and took wrong turn into a casino town.

I told them I really wanted to show them that. Haha. My son, the pastor, was able to use this story as a sermon illustration.

I have always struggled with patience.

I would often count the miles to go as we went along. the anticipation attitude of "are we there yet?" but I still do this sometimes.

"Are we there yet?" can be an appropriate question for Advent.

Advent is a season of anticipation.

Ultimately it is about anticipating the second coming of Christ.

However, it is easy to lose sight of this and focus on the upcoming Christmas celebrations.

It seems to me that the shopping season starts earlier and earlier I do not remember as a kid seeing Christmas items already up at Halloween.

When the Christmas season is over it's back to normalcy.

Another year.

Back to the grindstone.

Another Christmas come and gone.

What would it look like if we actually focused upon Jesus' second coming?

Some Christians do.

Many are obsessed with the end times and expect Jesus to return at any moment. They are looking for the rapture or signs of the great tribulation.

Many of them live in fear.

We Lutherans not so much.

We do confess in our creeds week after week "he will come again to judge the living and the dead," but do not discuss Jesus' 2nd coming much. Maybe it is because of passages such as today's. Jesus says to his followers "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father.... Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming."

We often look at the first part, where Jesus says that no one knows the day or the hour, and ignore the 2nd part of keeping awake. Or we may not want his second coming to come so quickly.

This reminds me of this joke:

Ole called the airlines information desk and inquired, "How long does it take ta fly from Minneapolis to Fargo?"

"Just a minute," said the busy clerk.

"Vell," said Ole, "if it has to go dat fast, I tink I'll yust take da bus."

Who wants to live in a constant rush?

In the midst of this chaotic world would it not be nice to simply have peace on earth and goodwill to all? Change is happening so quickly.

For instance, had any of us heard about A I (artificial intelligence) before?

It's getting more and more prevalent and a little scary.

There is so much dysfunction everywhere, such as in our government.

A lot of fear everywhere.

In the midst of it all, Jesus invites us to live both with also not to live on fear.

He says "Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect." He invites us to live each day staying focused on him.

Living one day at a time.

We live in between the already and the not yet. We can take comfort in that he has already come and lived and died and rose again for us, but also live in hope that he will come again to make all things right.

So "are we there yet?"

Not yet, but in the meantime we can live in the present loving and serving and supporting one another. Enjoy the Advent and Christmas seasons focused on Jesus.

The seasons come and go but he is present always. Keep coming back to worship and fellowship.

Keep hope alive.

Keep on keeping on.

Live for today. Amen.
