



Mosquito Hill Nature Center's New Era: The Next Chapter-Part 4 Master Plan

What is a Master Plan? A future vision and policy guide for the Outagamie County Parks Department and specifically Mosquito Hill Nature Center (MHNC). A master plan is the document that establishes the extent and types of uses on a public property, gives a general overview of facility development and acts as a guide for effective and efficient long-term planning.

In 2018, Outagamie County Parks initiated a series of listening sessions and surveys to develop a master plan for MHNC. In the 2018 plan, several concept drawings were prepared that included campgrounds, zip lines, pavilions, multiuse buildings, boardwalks through the lowlands, amphitheaters and so much more. That master planning process was not completed due to other parks' department priorities; however, MHNC needs this vital tool to function.

Parks Director Justin Schumacher and I revisited the 2018 master plan draft and then reviewed the original surveys and the data collected in 2018.

From this information, we revised the master plan concept to one that we thought best fit the mission, values and long-term needs of MHNC. This revised plan was presented to the Outagamie County Property, Airport, Recreation & Economic Development Committee. After many questions and a lot of discussion, the group concluded that we needed fresh data to ensure the master plan fit the current needs of the public.

We received approval to amend our contract with Rettler Corporation of Stevens Point, WI, to reopen the public survey and hold additional listening sessions. Rettler Corporation is a consultant firm hired by Outagamie

County to assist in helping to collect and interpret the data and information from the surveys and input sessions. For more than 35 years, Rettler Corporation has specialized in parks, recreation and open space design.

Through the month of October, we held sessions in Seymour, Hortonville, Combined Locks, Freedom, Appleton and at MHNC. Simultaneously, we reopened the public survey and collected feedback through early November. We will review all of the feedback and revise the master plan based on the comments and suggestions we have received from the community input sessions and surveys.

We will present this again to the Property, Airport, Recreation & Economic Development Committee and with their approval seek formal adoption from the Outagamie County supervisors. From there we can implement a master plan to help guide projects, collaborations, programs and funding requests. We will be able to make informed decisions that allow for efficient use of resources and budgets. The master plan will be an invaluable tool for our growth and development.

This has been a year of learning and collecting information. I started as the new naturalist in January and have learned so much about Mosquito Hill, the staff, the Friends of Mosquito Hill and all the visitors that make this such a wonderful place.

Thank you to all who participated in this process. We value your opinions and feedback and we are listening to each of you in developing a master plan. We look forward to sharing the final plan in early 2026.

In early October, a survey was sent to Friends of Mosquito Hill (FOMH) membership households. The survey's focus was to seek opinions and positions on a few issues related to the development of the Outagamie County's Mosquito Hill Nature Center's (MHNC) master plan.

The MHNC draft plan currently has a great deal of focus on future development of the former Kamp's property on top of the hill. The draft plan is causing concern to neighbors, FOMH members and the public about increased noise, loss of habitat and not aligning with MHNC's mission. FOMH contributed to the purchase of the Kamp's residence with the

desire to keep it wild and protect MHNC from further development. The request was made to

return the master plan survey as quickly as possible due to the short deadline for getting input shared with Outagamie County (OC). On behalf of the FOMH board, I would like to thank everyone who took the time to complete and return it

promptly. We are also very pleased with the number of members who participated. There were 200 surveys mailed out; more than 100 surveys were returned and are still coming in as of this writing. There is something that stands firm in the responses so far. There was unanimous positive consensus to three of the questions:

- 1. Restoring the hilltop area to a more natural habitat area, such as prairie, or bird-friendly habitat, or supporting a dark sky environment with walking trails would be more in line with the stated educational mission.
- 2. Any amount of development on the former residential site will reduce the serenity of the east side of the hill.
- 3. As much as possible, any building addition should be added on to or near the existing nature center building.

The FOMH board utilized these three core opinions to develop a statement of position for our agreedupon desired future project direction. We also used the data collected on the other six questions to guide our final statement that will be shared with OC. FOMH's goal is and always has been to support MHNC's mission.



Bike the Hill Fat Tire Bike Race

Saturday, January 31, 2026 | 2:00 PM Have you ever wanted to bike the trails at Mosquito Hill? Well, here is your chance. This one-hour race course will loop through the various terrains and habitats of Mosquito Hill Nature Center (MHNC). The race will be open to fat tire bikes only (tires must be 3.7+ inches wide). This will be the fourth annual race. Categories for males and females are age 16 years and younger, and 17 years and older. Special thanks to Blake and Faith Schlaeppi and Greg Prellwitz for helping to organize the event. Outagamie County Parks Department prohibits the use of bikes on its trails, including at MHNC. However, this is a one-time event and an exception to this ordinance. The registration fee covers race entry, race swag and the after-party ticket for food and beverage for the racer. Fans are welcome to attend the after-party and winner ceremony that will feature food and beverages for purchase in the nature center building. All proceeds benefit MHNC.

Naturalist's Corner

Winter Owling

Owls are birds that often capture the curiosity and fascination of many people. With their beauty, grace and mysterious nocturnal habits, it is easy to see why. These birds of prey are packed with unique adaptations from head to toe. Their beautiful colors and patterns perfectly camouflage them. Their large eyes and sensitive ears allow them to locate prey with pinpoint accuracy in broad daylight or the darkest nights. Their flight feathers are lined with extra "fringe" that allows them to fly silently. Their legs and feet are covered in feathers that help maintain that silence as well as also allow them to stay warmer than diurnal (daytime) birds, even on the coldest winter night. Of course, we cannot forget about their impressive talons with such strength that ensures any prey they catch is a guaranteed meal.

One of the most impressive and iconic owls we have in Wisconsin is the Great Horned Owl. These birds are comfortable living in deep wood lots or even suburban neighborhoods. Despite their name, those are not horns on their heads. Those "ear tufts" are not ears either. They are decorative feathers that can help the owl display emotion or disguise their presence.

While they are most active after dark, owls can be spotted during daylight hours as they attempt to blend into their environment or catch a midday nap. Since they

are experts of camouflage, spotting them can be difficult. You can sometimes rely on other birds, especially crows and blue jays, for help. These birds will often "mob" owls if they find them. If you see or hear an angry group of crows, it may just lead you to an owl. These impressive owls can hold their own, however, and are very strong. They are one of the only predators that actively hunt both skunks and porcupines.

Winter is the perfect time to watch and listen for these birds. Great Horned Owls are one of the earliest nesting birds in the state. While most birds lay their eggs in the spring and summer, these owls lay their eggs in January and February. A big reason for this is their nesting behavior, because they do not build their own nests. Instead, they will use a big tree cavity or take over nests made by crows, hawks or herons.

To avoid competition, the owls use the nests and get out before those other birds are ready to use the same nest. Because of this unique behavior, they begin their courtship and stake out their territory in December and January. Like other birds, this means they become more vocal. Great Horned Owls have a

traditional owl "hoot" that is a deep, resonating "Hoo-hoo-hoo-hoooo!" During these winter months, you can listen for this call after dark.
